RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The exhibition is to be held at the Exhibition building and grounds and to be continued open for five days. The first day opens at 10:00AM and closes at 10:00PM. Fair opens 10:00AM and closes at 10:00PM the following four days.
2. Admission Fees:

3. Trailer Fees:

Powered 15amp \$20/night	30amp \$25/night

4. Rules of Entry: Intending exhibitors and visitors are particularly requested to read and consider carefully the following rules and regulations covering the Exhibition, which will be strictly enforced.
5. Premiums: Open to the province to be awarded to competitors for articles of their own growth or production, or ownership in the case of livestock. In various classes, the entry must in every instance be made in the name of the bona fide owner. In all cases the exhibitor shall be considered the owner for the duration of the Exhibition. Unless this rule is observed, no prize will be awarded such entry.
6. Articles exhibited, excepting stock, must be the growth, production, or manufacture of the present year, except if otherwise noted.
7. No exhibits shall be received after 10:00AM the first day of the exhibition. Unavoidable delays to be dealt with at the discretion of the committee. Exhibitors are urgently requested to make their entries prior to the opening day. No article that is on exhibit is to be removed before 9:00PM on the closing day of the exhibition, under forfeiture of all prizes that may have been awarded to the exhibitor. Livestock not to be removed until 8:00PM on closing day.
8. Attention to Exhibits: Exhibitors will at all time give personal attention to their exhibits, and at the close of the Exhibition, take charge of same.
9. If the exhibit of any section be of inferior quality, the judges will award only such premiums as they deem advisable, and they may exercise their discretion as to whether they will award any premium. This applies also to exhibits wrongly entered.
10. Safety of Exhibits: Special employees will be in charge and with the aid of Police will endeavor to protect property and insure good order. Yet it must be distinctly understood that the owners themselves must assume all risk. Should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, while the Association will give all of the assistance in its power, it will not make any payment for the value thereof.

11. Each exhibitor will receive from the Secretary an entry tag for every article to be exhibited, and is required to affix such tag upon the article which is exhibited, specifying the class, section and exhibitor's number. Also, entry sheet to be filled in and returned to the Secretary.
12. Limit of Entries: No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen of required quantity in any one section or more than one specimen from any one farm, garden or manufactured. This rule is not to be applied to animals.
13. Declaration of Exhibitor: Exhibitors shall, if required, make a statutory declaration that the articles are exhibited in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Association, and in case any exhibitor refuses to make such declaration on being requested, all premiums awarded shall be forfeited.
14. Expenses of Transportation by Exhibitor: Exhibitors must provide for the delivery of their articles upon the Exhibition grounds. The Association cannot make provision for the transportation or be subject to any expense thereof, either on their delivery at, or return from the grounds. All expenses, connected therewithin must be provided by the exhibitors themselves, and all expenses and cartage charges must have been prepaid.
15. Exhibits Addressed to Manager: Articles not accompanied by their owners must have the exhibitor's name plainly marked thereon, and be addressed to the proper department, in care of the Exhibition, except by and at the expense of their owners or their authorized agents.
16. All exhibits must remain intact until the close of the exhibition.
17. Any person behaving in an ungentlemanly behavior will be banned from the Exhibition for the period of one year. The Board of Directors of the Shelburne County Exhibition have the authority to take disciplinary action against any unruly or ungentlemanly behavior.
18. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties, or shall attempt to influence their decisions by his presence or remarks shall forfeit his right to any prizes which he might otherwise be entitled to, and be otherwise dealt with as the committee may determine.
19. Judge to Refrain from Argument: The judges will not enter into argument with exhibitors as to the merits of their exhibits, but after judging a section, if time permits, they may state their reasons for their awards and answer reasonable questions.
20. How Judges Will Report: Judges will please sign and hand their list of awards to the Secretary or their assistant as soon as possible and make their more extended report afterward, with such recommendations as circumstances or their experience may suggest. The judges are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained that there are no protests against the awards in the classes which they have judged.

21. In the absence of sufficient numbers on a committee, the chairperson may choose a person or persons to assist the committee.
22. The award of the premiums will be paid in cash at the end of judging and after each competition.
23. Every exhibitor of livestock must, if required, make a statutory declaration that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, his herd is free from infections or contagious abortion before he shall be permitted to exhibit his herd or any portion thereof.
24. In all purebred classes the animals must be registered in the Canadian National Livestock Records or Association, approved by then, and such registration paper properly transferred to the exhibitor must be produced when required.
25. If the exhibit in any section be of interior quality, the judges will award only such premiums as they deem advisable, and they may exercise their discretion as to whether they will award any premium. This applies also to exhibits wrongly entered, such as dairy animals or beef classes.
26. For any cattle suspected to have ring-worm, the committee will call in an authorized veterinarian for inspection
27. Exhibitors not admitted: In all cases the right is reserved to reject entirely or to accept conditionally any entry or application; under no circumstances will animals which are suffering from contagious diseases, being of inferior condition or articles which are dangerous by reason of their combustible or explosive character, be admitted; and if such be introduced by an exhibitor, through misrepresentation or otherwise, they may be removed by order of the Manager.
28. The age of dairy cattle will be calculated from January 1st and September 1st of each year.
29. Ages of horses will be calculated to the first of January each year.
30. No animal under three months of age will be allowed to compete as separate entry.
31. All animals must be exhibited in the section set apart for their age. Younger animals will not be allowed to show in a section intended for older ones.
32. All animals must be shown in the ring and exhibitors must be ready to bring them out when called for.
33. Judging Rings: No person will be permitted in the judging rings during the time of the judging except the judges, their assistants, and the grooms.
34. All vehicles must be off the grounds by 10:00AM

35. All large livestock (oxen, cattle, draft horse & light horse) participants must show proof of liability insurance prior to showing.
36. No dogs on grounds unless for show or in campground. (Excluding support dogs). All dogs must be on a leash at all times.
37. No bicycles on the grounds during any events (i.e., exhibition, spring/fall haul, etc.)

DAIRY CATTLE

All animals must be shown on halter.

1. Registered bulls only
2. No animal under 3 months of age will be allowed to compete as a separate entry
3. No animal will be allowed to compete as a three-year-old cow unless she has had a calf

RULES FOR OX & HORSE HAULING

1. All ox teams are invited to attend Shelburne County Exhibition. All classes open to visiting teams
2. Teamsters cannot be changed
3. All hauling will be on a pound basis
4. All teams must be watered before being weighed
5. All teams must be walked on scales
6. Heavy draft teams to weigh 2,600lbs & up; light draft teams to weigh under 2,600lbs. Left to the discretion of the manager
7. All teamsters taking part in the contest to draw for placing
8. Only one teamster to each team, but a helper is allowed when hooking on to the drag and in case of accident or breakage
9. No excessive butting of horse teams; at the discretion of the judges
10. Any teamster judged to be under the influence of liquor will not be allowed to compete. No whips allowed with the horses. In the case of oxen, whips may be used but lash must be kept in hand. No cruelty will be tolerated on the exhibition grounds to any animal. No profane language to be used during contests. Any teamsters committing any of these offenses will forfeit his right in any contest.
11. White lines are to be used, either on wood or lime: 11 feet apart for horses, 9 feet apart for oxen
12. Pulling distance: 36" to be used for both horses and oxen. Oxen have three starts to move the load 36": horses have three starts but load must move 36" in on start. In case of breakage of harness or yoke, after repairs are made the teamster will be allowed to break the drag loose by a side pull which will not count as one of the three starts.
13. A time limit of 15 minutes will be allowed for each team to complete their pull. If breakage occurs, time off will be allowed, maximum of 15 minutes.
14. Concerning all teams, horses and oxen: If any one animal of any one team be so blemished or in poor condition, the judge and committee shall have the right to eliminate the team from competition.

15. Each swing shall constitute a pull at the judge's discretion.
16. Minimum starting load for teams: heavy draft-weight of team; light draft-weight of team
17. All placings in pulling contests will be made on a % basis. All teams to pull in the same directions and pull to finish
18. A team must be in the hauling position to be disqualified for stepping over the lines. The hauling position means when a teamster is teaming the cattle by being in front of, behind, throwing dirt on, slapping the boxes, or doing anything to start the cattle, at the judge's discretion
19. In case of a tie the team that pulls first will be the winner. The heaviest load will be determined by the last successful haul.
20. During pulling contests only the judge, scorer, announcer, loader and one teamster are allowed in the ring. Non-active teamsters to stay seated in area outside of the ring. In the case of horse hauls, helpers will be permitted in ring but cannot assist in actual teaming or loading of drag.
21. Drug testing can and may be done. Prize money will be held until results of drug test is received and prizes will be forfeited if the animal tests positive for drugs. Teamster will be barred from the following years exhibition.

Grade A: Clean eggs, sound in shell

Candling Definition Yoke Distinct: yolk shadows reasonably small and round in shape, maintaining position in center of egg; yolk shall float freely around egg on twirling; mottled yolks, or invisible germ spots not allowed; air cells less than 1/4" inch in depth; floating air cells not allowed

Weight: eggs to be graded and marked “Grade A” shall weigh individually at the rate of 24 ounces and up, to the dozen. The word large may be used in conjunction with eggs of this weight

Eggs meeting the requirements of “Grade A” with the exception of weight but which weigh individually at the rate of 22 to 24 ounces to the dozen may be graded and marked as medium.

RULES GOVERNING FIELD ROOTS & MARKET VEGETABLES

1. In all sections the prizes shall be as indicated
2. In all vegetable and field roots, quality is an important factor. Usually, the medium sizes are better quality than large over grown or stunted specimens
